## POST SECONDARY INFORMATION: 2020-2021

# Before you become committed to attending a college or university next September, have you considered the following:

1. A Gap Year: When a student takes a year off after completing high school and entering post-secondary, the time spent is usually referred to as a gap year. A gap year filled with work, travel, volunteer opportunities, and personal reflection may serve you well in the future. Check out 'gap year' websites.

2. Registered Private Schools: There are a variety of private colleges and schools that offer condensed instruction in specific skills and careers. These programs cost more money but take less time. The schools emphasize their ability to find employment for graduates. Be sure that the private college you are interested in is registered with the Ontario Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities.

3. Canadian Armed Forces: Career training is possible for Grade 12 graduates. The Canadian Armed Forces offers graduates the opportunity to receive a post-secondary education in combination with a commitment to service. Start with an interview with a recruiter.

4. Apprenticeships: An apprenticeship is an opportunity to learn a skilled trade on the job while being paid. CO-OP and OYAP teachers can give you more information. An apprenticeship also requires mandatory classroom instruction, with this cost being largely covered by the provincial government. 5. Workforce: Students interested in joining the workforce directly after high school can visit a counsellor at Job Gym. Their website is www.jobgym.com

# Before you narrow down your school and program choices for post-secondary education to your final choices on your application, have you considered:

1. Applied Degrees: You can work toward a Bachelor Degree at a college as well as at a university. The advantages to earning your degree at a college are smaller class sizes and a more hands-on and career-focused approach to your learning. Faculty in these programs come with previous industry experience. Experiential learning within your program (such as paid co-op) provide real-life experiences.

2. College to University Transfer Agreements: You can combine theoretical learning (university) with practical skills (college) through a combined diploma/degree program, or by transferring to a university after completing your college diploma. In this manner, students who graduate high school with ENG4C, can still earn a degree. More information is available at www.ontransfer.ca

3. Full Disclosure of Transcripts: Full disclosure on high school transcripts provides post-secondary institutions an accurate reflection of the prospective students' work habits and scholastic achievements. Repeated attempts and original marks of all Grade 11 and 12 courses will be reflected on a student's transcript. To avoid registering a poor mark on the transcript, students have 5 days after their midterm report to withdraw from a course. Different post-secondary institutions have varying policies toward repeated attempts which may affect your opportunity for admission.

4. Reviewing Courses in First Year: To help you choose between two similar programs at two different institutions, take a look at the actual courses you will be taking in first year. You may find a significant difference in what you are required to take, which may assist you in your decision making.

Now that you have begun to narrow down your post-secondary choices, you should visit the schools that you are interested in, and their websites. You can book virtual tours and attend virtual Open Houses at various colleges and universities. Below are some sample questions you may want to consider asking at the virtual tour or presentation:

- What programs are this school best known for?
- Do they offer co-op and experiential learning programs? If so, in which areas? What costs are associated with this?
- I'm interested in your scholarship program please tell me about it.
- What supports do you offer for students with identifications and learning needs?
- How much is tuition for the program that I am interested in?
- How much can I expect to pay for textbooks and materials?
- Is residence guaranteed? What is the cost? What are the meal plan options?
- What social networks are in place to help me get to know people?
- How do I find out what extra-curriculars are available and how to sign up?
- How do I get an on-campus job?
- Can I transfer to (from) your school after first year? Will I lose credits?
- What is your graduate job placement rate?
- What are the sizes of first year classes?

# Are you ready to decide on your program/school selection? Make sure that you know the answers to the following questions:

- Do your schools make alternative offers of admission?
- Are you considering more than one program choice at your university?
- How do your schools utilize Grade 11 marks?
- Are there supplemental applications?
- Is there a deferral policy?
- What is the policy on repeated courses?
- What is the policy on night school, summer school, eLearning, and virtual school courses?
- Will the order in which you rank a program/school on the OUAC application affect admission?
- What supports are available for your transition to university?
- How do the scholarship opportunities compare between your schools?

# <u>IMPORTANT DATES</u> – It is strongly recommended that potential grads complete their post-secondary applications BEFORE December Break in order to avoid undue stress and potential disappointment.

#### SECOND: APPLYING TO COLLEGES AND PROGRAMS: HOW DO YOU GET IN?

#### What You Need to Apply to College

- 1. Ontario Secondary School Diploma
- 2. Grade 12 English (ENG4C)
- 3. You may need certain specific courses, depending on the program you want to apply to (for example, for most schools, Dental Hygiene students need Grade 12 English, Grade 11 Biology, and Grade 12 Chemistry)
- 4. Admission average is usually based on your Grade 12 courses, except if certain other courses are required (for example, Grade 11 Biology)

#### How to Apply to College

- 1. www.ontariocolleges.ca you apply online this does not usually start until the middle of October
- OEN # you can find this on your timetable or report card if you can't find it, come to Student Services
- Fees \$95.00 (non-refundable) this allows you to apply to 5 college programs, with no more than 3 programs at any one specific college. You may pay through a credit card or online banking
- Deadline February 1, 2021 this is the final date to submit your completed application online in order to be considered for all possible programs to which you apply \*More information will follow regarding the application process

- 3. Student Services we have information books for Ontario, as well as some out-of-province universities
- 4. University presentations we have arranged virtual presentations with several universities, which will be held in October and November 2020. The link to the specific virtual meeting will be posted in Google Class of 2021, so you can easily access it on the day of the presentation. Students are to join all meetings with the camera off and the microphone muted; during Q&A time, students may turn on their microphones if the presenter grants permission, but cameras must remain off. #### SECOND: APPLYING TO UNIVERSITIES AND PROGRAMS: HOW DO YOU GET IN?

#### What You Need to Apply to University

- 1. Ontario Secondary School Diploma
- 2. 6 courses at the Grade 12 U/M level, one of which must be ENG4U
- 3. You may need certain specific courses, depending on the program you want to apply to (for example, for most schools, Nursing students need Grade 12 English, Biology, Chemistry, one Math, and two other courses at the Grade 12 U/M level)
- 4. Admission average is usually based on your top 6 U/M courses, including English and any other required courses for the program

#### How To Apply to University

- www.ouac.on.ca you apply online this does not usually start until the middle of November
- 2. PIN # Student Services will distribute your PIN # to you in the Fall
- Fees \$150.00 (non-refundable) this allows you to apply to 3 university programs. You may pay an additional \$50.00 for EACH additional university program selected after the first three choices (eg. 5 university program choices = \$250.00). You may pay through a credit card or online banking
- Deadline January 15, 2021 this is the final date for you to submit your completed application online to OUAC

#### THIRD: PAYING FOR YOUR PROGRAM AT SCHOOL: WHERE DO YOU GET THE MONEY?

#### Loans (Money you have to pay back)

Loan - a certain amount of money that you are borrowing. It must be paid back to the company who is lending it to you (OSAP, bank, etc). You must pay back all of the money you borrow PLUS interest on the money. Interest is basically a fee that you are charged for borrowing the money. For example, if you borrow \$5000 from OSAP, you will have to pay back the \$5000 PLUS a certain amount of interest (the amount of interest changes every year, but a realistic amount of interest on \$5000 right now would be \$600).

#### How do I get loans as a student?:

#### 1. OSAP (Ontario Student Assistance Program)

If you borrow money from OSAP, you do not have to pay it back until you are finished with your college or university program.

www.ontario.ca/osap – this is the site you use to apply – you cannot apply until the Spring (usually April or May) – we will announce when the site has opened for applications

Do not apply for OSAP until you have decided on and accepted an offer of admission

Further information, through webinars and/or virtual presentations, on how to apply to OSAP will become available in the Spring.

#### 2. Bank Loans

If you borrow money from a bank as a student, it is called a Student Line of Credit. As soon as you begin borrowing the money, you have to begin paying the interest on it every month (it automatically comes out of your bank account).

Go to your specific bank (CIBC, Scotiabank, etc) if you are interested in applying for a Student Line of Credit; you will need a parent/guardian with you to apply.

#### Scholarships and Bursaries (Free Money)

**Scholarship** – money given to the student based on academic achievement (marks) and/or exceptional ability in a certain area (extracurricular activities like sports or music, community involvement, volunteer involvement). The money does not have to be paid back.

**Bursary** – money given to the student based on financial need. The money does not have to be paid back.

#### How do I get scholarships and bursaries?:

- Ask people does the place where your parent(s) work offer scholarships or bursaries? Does the place where you work offer them? Do you belong to a particular club or association (sports, music, dance, cultural clubs, community clubs, etc) that may offer scholarships to its members?
- 2. Get letters of reference usually scholarship or bursary applications ask for a Reference Letter from a teacher, coach, boss, or someone else who can vouch for the type of person you are. You do not want to leave this until the last minute. Give the person enough time to write the letter. When you ask the person to do you this favour, you should give them a list of things you have done so that the person can mention them in the reference letter.
- 3. Start researching see the attached list of websites for some ideas of where to find bursary and scholarship applications

\*\*YOU need to start doing all of this research NOW. DO NOT PUT THIS OFF.\*\*

- A) Start researching different colleges and universities to find out which ones have the programs that YOU are interested in. Researching schools and programs takes a large amount of time.
- B) Start researching different financial assistance opportunities (bursaries and scholarships). There is a lot of free money out there, but the applications take time, and the deadlines for some are fast approaching.
